In the ELCA, we describe these instructions as "faith practices" that guide our daily living.







Building { faith practices }











As members of the ELCA, we are called to practice our faith by "living among God's faithful people." This means we gather as people of faith and fulfill our call to be the body of Christ in our congregations, community and the world by worshipping, engaging in mission and praying. But we always want to build our faith.

One way you can do that is by deepening your prayer life. Consider having a group of congregations in your area sponsor a prayer event coordinated by the Renewal Team of the ELCA. You might also study "Story Matters: Naming, Claiming and Living Our Biblical Identity." This resource can help you or your congregation engage with scripture to strengthen the ways you practice your faith.

As Lutherans, reading and studying scripture, preaching and sharing in Holy Communion and Baptism are how we define what it means to be the church together. Whether participating in Bible study or worship back home with your congregation, or in other settings, Christ is present in all our gatherings.

But it isn't enough to simply come together to receive God's grace in these tangible ways. We are always sent back out to become God's presence to a hurting world that needs to hear, see, touch and taste God's presence. The baptismal covenant calls each of us to this important ministry: to gather as the body of Christ but, more importantly, to be the body of Christ in the world.

It is easy to envision a pastor in the pulpit on Sunday morning bringing the word of God to the people gathered. But through our baptismal covenant, every believer is called to proclaim the good news in Jesus Christ. This means not only pastors, but everyone. And, we are called to do this not just once, or every once in a while, but every day. We are to do this not only in our own life, but as the body of Christ together.

One of the ways we proclaim the good news is through the story of God's movement in our lives. Whether a personal encounter with God, an experience with a friend or neighbor, or serving others abroad, we have an opportunity to touch the lives of others with God's word. In this way we are stewards of God's word and God's commission to reach out to others. Thus we are living out the story of Christ in us by proclaiming God's saving grace and work in the world today.

Serving as Jesus served is a way to take up the cross and follow Jesus. He set an example for all of us to follow: Jesus washed the feet of others, fed the 5,000, healed the sick, and raised the dead. He did this out of his great love for others. When we serve others we are called to freely share our time, skills, abilities and possessions that God has given us. When we serve, we should serve in love, walking alongside our brothers and sisters in mutuality and vulnerability.

This September, congregations of this church will gather to serve communities in ways that share the love of God with all of God's people. Encourage your congregation to participate in "God's work. Our hands." Sunday and give back to your community.
