Gracing a community with compassion in New Jersey

St. Stephan's Grace Community Lutheran Church is located in a diverse community in Newark, N.J., with many of the congregants coming from low-income immigrant families. The residents were heavily impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, and food insecurity, already high, has increased.

Elza and her family migrated from Ecuador to Newark with very few belongings. One day, she attended a community meeting at St. Stephan's Grace and found signs of hope. She learned about a food-sharing program at the church receiving support from your gifts to ELCA World Hunger. It has a community pantry and refrigerator, a garden and a daily breakfast for local day laborers. The garden yields basil, spring onions, tomatoes, green squash, eggplant, figs and collard greens.

As Elza and her husband looked for jobs, they picked up groceries from St. Stephan's Grace each week to feed their family. They also received clothing and used appliances, such as a microwave and an air conditioning unit, from the church programs as they set up their new home.

Addressing food insecurity is just one of the many ways St. Stephan's Grace serves its community. In an area populated primarily by immigrants, advocacy is a key element of the church's ministry. A program at the church offers training in community organizing,



migrant and domestic workers' rights, and justice work. It even hosted a panel with New Jersey's governor to celebrate a raise in the state's minimum wage.

Already a community hub, St. Stephan's Grace is growing its ministries to better serve neighbors such as Elza, thanks to your generosity to ELCA World Hunger. "As a church, we would not be able to make it without our partners," said the Rev. Moacir Weirich, pastor of St. Stephan's Grace. "We would be very limited in terms of resources, both financial and human resources."

St. Stephan's Grace is also a place for celebration. Not long after learning about the church, Elza explained to Pastor Weirich that one of her daughters was turning 16 soon and asked if she could use one of the rooms in the church to host a birthday party. Pastor Weirich said yes,

and family members came together at the church on a Saturday evening. Pastor Weirich shared a blessing, and the group joyfully indulged in a birthday cake.

Elza’s involvement with St. Stephan’s Grace started with a bag of groceries. Now her family is very active in the

church. They attend services every Sunday, and two of the children are on the church council. In a time of great need for her family, Elza found more than just food assistance — she found a welcoming community, a place of belonging and a way to give back.



Empowering refugees in Cairo

When war broke out in Sudan, 17-year-old Ala and 15-year-old Ali fled to another part of the country at their mother's encouragement while she stayed home. They hoped to return soon, but as the war escalated, the brothers remained separated from their mother and were forced to flee even further. Traveling with a Sudanese father and his three sons, the boys arrived safely in Egypt.

Initially the father took in Ala and Ali. New to the country himself, he struggled to cover his and his children's basic needs, let alone Ali and Ala's living expenses. The brothers heard about St. Andrew's Refugee Services (StARS) and its work equipping refugees with the resources they need to resettle. StARS, which is supported by your generosity to ELCA World Hunger, has a specific program to support unaccompanied children such as Ali and Ala.

Through initial screenings, Ala and Ali were assigned a case worker who helped them navigate the resources available to them. Due to their ages, the case was considered urgent, and Ala and Ali received emergency food boxes, financial assistance, clothing, blankets, counseling and close follow-up as they established themselves in a new community.

The boys continued to receive food assistance and financial support beyond those initial emergency food boxes. This enabled them to alleviate some of the financial stress of the home they shared with their caregiver and his three sons, contributing to rent payments and sharing their meals. Ali and Ala were eager to return to school, which they did. They also had the opportunity to attend group therapy and process their trauma with peers who had similar experiences. They made new friends and participated in trainings, which strengthened their ability to acclimate to their new country and culture effectively.



Ali has experience repairing electronics, a skill he learned in Sudan. He looks forward to turning 18, which will allow him to enroll in a livelihood program, enhance his skills and open his own business in Cairo. The brothers hope to reconnect with their mother soon, but for now they are focusing on their education and on integrating into the community.

Your generosity transforms the lives of young refugees such as Ala and Ali, providing them with the tools they need to rebuild their lives and pursue their dreams. With your support, the brothers have gained confidence, forged connections and acquired vital skills for a successful future. Together we can continue to empower young refugees to find their place in the world and thrive in their new communities.

Sewing hope in Colombia

LIVELIHOOD



Martha, a 70-year-old grandmother in Boyacá, Colombia, learned to sew when she was very young, accompanying her mother on various housekeeping jobs. Eventually she began sewing and designing clothing of her own. As a teenager, she provided for her family by traveling on foot to a nearby town to sell her clothing, and she continued to make and sell clothing as a young mother. Like many in Boyacá, Martha and her family lacked access to education, drinking water and hygiene facilities. They lived with food insecurity and limited employment opportunities.

Martha took pride in her skills as a seamstress and designer and her ability to contribute to supporting her family. Still it was tough. The need to stay home and care for her three small children became more demanding, and her clothing work, once a passion, became a means of survival as her already difficult economic reality worsened. Decades passed. “My life had gone by without me realizing it,” Martha observes.

Then a neighbor introduced her to a Lutheran church with educational and training opportunities that interested her. This Lutheran church is part of a strong network of Lutheran congregations in Colombia (IELCO) with significant outreach programs, all supported by your gifts to ELCA World Hunger. Through these various, long-standing programs, children learn to support their own educations, strengthen their food security through training and community gardening, and develop professional skills that lead to employment or entrepreneurial endeavors.

A group of young leaders raised in these Lutheran churches recognized this good, impactful work and were inspired to create a new project of their own – also made possible in part by your generosity to ELCA World Hunger. These passionate leaders, deeply affected by the impact of climate change in their region, wanted to do more to educate fellow Lutherans in their communities about the problem.

People in this region of Colombia have been particularly vulnerable to the changing climate and its effect on inequality, poverty and food security. This new program – the one that caught Martha’s attention – aims to identify the existing gifts and interests of participants, enhancing their livelihoods while promoting care for creation.

As a woman selling her designs, Martha hadn’t thought much about the big swings in weather, from intense heat to heavy rainfall, over the years. She had considered the weather on any given day to be a matter of luck, and she needed to travel on foot to sell her work regardless.

Now Martha was eager to connect her skills and passion for design to what she had learned through participating in the program. She began recycling materials such as old magazines and single-use plastics to develop new products, such as jewelry and home decor items, that she sells at a local market.

She feels confident that she is caring for creation, and she has renewed her passion for design work, all while creating a new income stream for her family, including the children and grandchildren who live with her. “It is never too late to connect with creation,” she reflects.

Martha has taken another step and begun teaching others in her program how to make similar products. The women now feel more connected to God’s creation and each other and are living fulfilled lives. As a donor to ELCA World Hunger, you are empowering these women, regardless of their age or place in society, to weave God’s love into a future filled with hope.





Expenditures by region





As congressional budget talks target programs used in marginalized communities, including Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits and Medicaid, Lutheran advocates have been engaged through ELCA Witness in Society as well as locally driven efforts. Visits to Capitol Hill are urgent and do matter, as experienced in March 2025 when ELCA staff met with elected officials in Washington, D.C., to discuss ELCA schools, education policy and student needs — including public-private school partnerships and the vitality of school lunch programs for low-income students.

Beacons of hope

Since the Oct. 7, 2023, attacks by Hamas and Israel's subsequent invasion of Gaza, the hardships faced by Palestinians in the West Bank, who are already living under Israeli occupation, have only intensified. Travel is even more restricted, and over 90 new checkpoints have been established in the Bethlehem area alone. The tourist economy, on which many Palestinians rely, has become almost nonexistent. Some families now must choose between putting food on their table or paying for their children's school tuition. But thanks to your gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response, some families don't have to make that choice anymore.

Lutheran Disaster Response has ensured that schools run by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land (ELCJHL) can stay open. Your generosity has made this critical funding possible, covering the cost of textbooks, after-school programs and, most important,

tuition for more than 580 students. Schools offer students stability amid the violent upheaval in their communities. Though parents still face great anxiety about the future, they no longer need to worry about whether their child will be able to attend school.

The schools, serving kindergarteners to high school students, also offer critical care for students' emotional and physical well-being. School social workers consistently support students by providing counseling, helping them process emotions and looking for signs of hope.

Karimeh (name changed) is a young social worker, someone with whom students can talk and process their experiences. When she counsels students, she relives her own traumatic episodes, such as Israeli forces coming into her home and arresting her father-in-law.



Lutheran Disaster Response shares hope, healing and renewal with people in the United States and around the world whose lives have been disrupted by disasters. Your gifts support disaster survivors as they work to rebuild.



Karimeh remains steadfast in her work out of love and respect for her community, knowing that she makes a difference and provides a pillar of support for the students. She sees hope, even when her students can't. She helps them find that hope.

The school social workers used to work 20-30 cases per week, but now they work as many as 60. The trauma the students are facing is abundant and the workers are overwhelmed, but they carry on because they see how necessary their work is.

The ELCJHL schools, attended by students of different religious backgrounds, serve as a beacon of hope in their communities. In addition to keeping up with regular classes, students as young as kindergarten learn peace mediation skills. They are given space to express themselves through art, music and traditional dance. When there is so much anxiety and difficulty in the rest of their lives, school provides a place of safety for youth in the West Bank.

Your gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response help ELCJHL schools to remain open and continue offering high-quality education and care to students. Amid uncertainty in the Middle East, Lutheran Disaster Response maintains support for communities affected by conflict, emphasizing dignity, justice and lasting peace.

Augusta Victoria Hospital in Jerusalem is one of the largest hospitals in the area and the only one that provides cancer treatment for Palestinian patients. Since Oct. 7, 2023, many patients from Gaza have been unable to return home, but Lutheran Disaster Response has supported them with housing and supplies, so they were able to stay near the hospital and continue their treatments.

Augusta Victoria is also transporting medical supplies into Gaza, providing lifesaving care through a partnership with al-Ahli Arab Hospital, one of the few hospitals still operating in Gaza. Despite having been damaged by multiple bombings, al-Ahli continues to provide care as much as possible. The medical supplies from Augusta Victoria are critical to that goal, especially as funding from other organizations diminishes. The need for health care in Gaza is extensive and increasingly complicated. Thanks to your generosity, Lutheran Disaster Response can ensure that people get the health services they need.
