Lutheran Services in America recognizes its network for National Adoption Awareness Month

A diverse and powerful network, Lutheran Services in America (LSA) has a strong national child-welfare presence. Of the 300 Lutheran organizations that LSA represents, more than 100 serve children, youth and families. In honor of National Adoption Awareness Month in November, LSA recognizes these organizations and the stories of those they serve.

Upbring (formerly Lutheran Social Services of the South) was one of the first agencies in the country to offer open adoption services. Coupled with free one-on-one support and counseling to birth parents, Upbring's open adoption services help transform a taxing adoption process for birth parents into a positive experience. One such birth parent is Laura Reyes, who worked with Upbring to find the right couple to adopt her baby girl.

Thanks to the organization's extensive screening process for adoptive couples, Reyes found a perfect match. "For months leading up to this moment, I thought finding the perfect parents would be too difficult, and yet here they were, in the first book [listing information about potential adoptive parents] I saw," she said.

Crystal and Dustin Harris, as an adoptive couple, appreciated the way Upbring treated adoptive couples as well as birth parents.

"We were very happy with how birth mothers were treated and spoken of so well," Crystal said. "We were made to feel like actual people rather than just a number on a long list. Tanya Graham [the director of Domestic Adoptions] was great to work with. She was on top of things and even came to court with us."

Along with open adoption, LSA pioneered international adoption. Jonalyn, a teenage girl from the Philippines, was adopted by Joel and Sharon Tomski through Lutheran Social Services of Wisconsin and Upper Michigan Ambassador Program. This program, like many others in the LSA network, helps older children aging out of foster care find forever families in the U.S.

These are just a few of the stories made possible by organizations in the LSA network. Thanks to the tireless effort of these organizations, thousands of children have warm homes, loving families and bright hopes for the future.

Worship and culture: A diverse and beautiful relationship

If you have worshiped in another congregation, setting or context, you may have noticed that not every worship service is the same, even in the ELCA. While there are central things that link us around the means of grace, we worship and experience worship in a multitude of ways. Within the ELCA, we gather weekly as worshiping communities in more than 9,300 congregations with 42 languages represented.

As a church, as God's people, we center and ground ourselves and our mission in worship around word, meal and baptism. We gather to sing, pray and praise God. We bring who we are into worship. We bring our own culture and the culture of our upbringing, the cultures of our neighborhoods, the cultures we are called into ministry, mission and service with, and we join with the cultures that everyone else brings with them into worship.

Questions that help nurture our worship life

How can the beauty and diversity of those cultures be seen as gifts in our church's worship life? How can culture help shape our liturgies and even our understanding of worship in much deeper ways? How can these intentional conversations lead us into becoming a much more richly diverse church? All of these questions, and more, are crucial to nurturing the worship life of each of our worshiping communities.

So, the ELCA has developed a resource, "Can We Talk? Engaging Worship and Culture," as a gift for you and

your congregation to use. The hope is that this resource will lead to fruitful conversations about worship and culture and will enhance your worship life and enrich the faith of the people who gather with you. This resource was mailed to every congregation and every rostered leader in August and is also available at ELCA.org/worship.

"Can We Talk? Engaging Worship and Culture" is a resource to accompany conversations about worship and culture in our respective faith community contexts. It comes out of the realization that an important document written two decades ago still has much to contribute to worship renewal. The "Nairobi Statement on Worship and Culture," written by the Department for Theology and Studies of The Lutheran World Federation in 1996, provides us with a rich description of the dynamic relationship between worship and culture and gives us lenses to help frame our conversations.

A lens alters how we perceive what is in front of us—shading when the light is too bright, magnifying what is near or too far away. In a similar way, the "Nairobi Statement" alters our vision by showing us four ways worship relates to culture: transcultural, countercultural, contextual and cross-cultural.

An invitation to gather with worship leaders

Another way we will be engaging in this conversation about worship and culture is through an upcoming Worship at the Center event. "Worship at the Center: Engaging Worship and Culture," will be Feb. 19-21 at St. Paul Lutheran Church in Santa Monica, Calif. This three-day event will be for pastors, musicians, lay leaders and worship committees. Participants will have an opportunity to dive deeper into this resource, hear from one another about how their culture shapes liturgy and how the liturgy even shapes local culture. There will be workshops, keynotes and practical pieces to take home—all centered in worshiping together throughout the event.

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
World AIDS Day 2016


'Love Beyond Measure' devotional guide for Lutheran educators

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The new ELCA Federal Credit Union is open to serve your financial needs

"With the church as its sponsor, the ELCA Federal Credit Union operates in ways that are consistent with the church's values, making it a socially responsible way to do your banking," the credit union's website, **elcafcu.org**, explains.

The credit union opened its doors in early June to give ELCA members an alternative in banking. Now the fourth financial ministry of the ELCA, the credit union is the first to offer consumer loans—including auto loans and personal loans.

"As a not-for-profit financial cooperative, the credit union exists to serve its members—not to make a profit. Earnings are returned to members through more competitive rates on deposits and loans, fewer fees and enhanced services," says Chief Operations Officer Luis Reyes.

Supporting the ELCA's mission

Creation of this ELCA-sponsored credit union supports the ELCA's mission to promote wise stewardship of members' financial resources. "While the ELCA Federal Credit Union is a separate entity from the ELCA churchwide organization, the credit union will operate with the church's mission and values in mind," says the Rev. Arnold Pierson, president of the credit union. "When you choose to participate in the ELCA Federal Credit Union, you will work with a financial institution that is rooted in your faith community. This is a socially responsible way to do your banking."

Who can join and what services are available?

Currently, individual members of the ELCA can join the ELCA Federal Credit Union by opening a savings account with a \$25 deposit and maintaining that \$25 balance. A more complex, robust online banking system necessary for congregations and ministries—allowing for authorization of signers—will allow those organizations to participate in 2017.

Credit union members have access to an array of financial products and services, including: savings accounts, checking accounts, certificates of deposit, auto loans, personal loans, and credit and debit cards. Members have free ATM access through a worldwide network of ATMs, and deposits are insured up to \$250,000. Auto loans start as low as 1.99 percent APR (annual percentage rate) for qualified buyers. Credit card interest rates start as low as 7.99 percent APR, and the credit union does not charge transaction fees for balance transfers or cash advances.

Members also get the convenience of online banking, online bill payment, e-statements, a mobile app, direct deposit, account-to-account transfer to link with your accounts at other financial institutions and person-to-person fund transfers.

to Windhoek" that celebrates the leadership and participation of women in the ongoing Reformation, 1517-2017.



Poverty and economic justice not forgotten by Luther



A new book and video series, "The Forgotten Luther," is here just in time for the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. Martin Luther's critique of the church is well-known. What is less well-known is his sharp critique of an economy that left so many people in poverty.

In "The Forgotten Luther: Reclaiming the Social-Economic Dimension of the Reformation," leading Lutheran theologians and scholars trace the roots of charity and justice in Luther's writings, from his call for economic reforms to his support for job training programs, fair economic policies and service of the neighbor. The chapters also raise questions for us as Lutherans today.

"The Forgotten Luther" comes with discussion questions to guide reflection as well as videos from the Forgotten Luther Conference in 2015, supported in part by ELCA World Hunger, where the chapters were first presented. Short video interviews with each of the authors are also available.

Little Free Libraries are a global phenomenon. The small, front-yard book exchanges number 36,000 around the world in 70 countries—from Iceland to Tasmania to Pakistan. Now, a new Little Free Library at St. Andrew Lutheran Church in Hurst, Texas, will join the movement to share books, bring people together and create new communities of readers.


Members of St. Andrew designed the library in the shape of a well. They were inspired by the story of the well in John 4 in which Jesus meets the Samaritan woman at the well while she is drawing water. He then offers her living water, his unconditional love and forgiveness.

St. Andrew members seek to offer God's love to their community in as many ways as possible. They hope the Little Free Library on their front lawn will provide the gifts of knowledge, escape, adventure and fulfillment that books bring, as well as become a beacon of God's love in the daily routines of their neighbors.

The library has books for adults, youth and children in both English and Spanish. Neighbors and people passing by are welcome to stop and browse, borrow a book and even contribute books.

Join the conversation on faith, sexism and justice



Imagine if you could have a conversation with people throughout the ELCA!

"Faith, Sexism and Justice: Conversations Toward a Social Statement." In this study prepared by the ELCA Task Force on Women and Justice: One in Christ, individuals, adult forums, youth groups, faculty groups and others will join a conversation about issues related to women and justice in church and society.

Seven modules form the study, and each explores one of these questions:

- 1. Why do we need to talk about women and justice together?
- 2. What problems do women face, and what does justice require?
- 3. How is sexism personal, and how are we the body of Christ together?
- 4. What does economic sexism look like, and how can we seek equity for all?
- 5. How can we address violence against women and girls?

- You can, as a participant in the new study, 6. Why do images and words for God "Faith, Sexism and Justice: Conversaments." 6. Why do images and words for God matter?
 - 7. How do we challenge the misuse of Scripture against women and girls?

Your thoughts and responses can be shared with the task force through an online or paper survey for each module. The response period runs until Aug. 31. Responses will inform and help members of the task force as they prepare a draft social statement.

Connecting Christ's love with military service members, veterans and their families

Our nation continues to endure its longest war at 15 years and counting. Though large-scale deployments of troops to Iraq and Afghanistan have ebbed, people in uniform continue to deploy to more than 30 countries. More than 2 million men and women are veterans of combat deployments since 9/11. Many of them and their families are members of our congregations.

The ELCA cares

In the ELCA Office of the Presiding Bishop, the director for federal chaplaincies has launched the Centurion Connection, a synod- and congregation-based network of people reaching out to military service members, veterans and their families. Twenty synods have an identified local Centurion contact. Using a volunteer network, they use a collaborative website available to all ELCA congregations, elcachaps.com.

Centurion contacts offer ideas and resources for how to honor and care for the needs of veterans and their families. They use resources available through the website, including scholarships for seminarians interested in chaplaincy, worship resources and ideas, information on how to deal with post-traumatic stress syndrome, suicide prevention and more. Our church acts

In concert with a memorial, or proposal, passed at the 2016 Churchwide Assembly, the voices of our church will be raised in prayer to God on the Sunday closest to Veterans Day and other national holidays. We seek ordered civic life and respect for the dignity and worth of each person created in the image of God. We remember the impact of family separation and mobility for veterans, those currently serving and their families. We pray for the right use of power and just pursuit of peace. Through our prayers, we support and encourage the witness of our ELCA pastors in

chaplaincy. Prayer is powerful, and knowing your church remembers you in prayer creates and embodies hope.

There are opportunities for pastors and interested lay leaders to receive training to support active military and veterans. Visit **elcachaps.com** or talk to a Centurion contact. The church is also discovering among its active and veteran military, people skilled in reaching young people, dealing with pluralism, reacting



positively to disasters and other areas of ministry. These are men, women and young adults ready for active roles in congregations and communities. Seek them out in your congregations or through the ELCA Federal Chaplaincy Ministry Updates Facebook page.

Christ's love is inclusive, active and most effective when we engage all of God's people in our ministry and service in the world.

We can raise healthy boys

A 2014 study of sex trafficking in Minneapolis found that the sex-trade industry operates on the basic market rules of supply and demand. Sex buyers (the demand) rely on traffickers to provide them with juvenile victims (supply). The study concludes that one way to stop sex trafficking is to prevent the "demand." And it states that men must drive that movement.

Cherish All Children, a nonprofit organization affiliated with the ELCA, is seeking to engage men in this movement to "end the demand" and is urging congregations to view the movie, "The Mask You Live In." Last spring, 13 congregations in the Minneapolis Area Synod hosted screenings of the documentary with discussions afterward to move this effort forward. "It was so well received by those who viewed it. I wish even more could see it—parents, youth, young adults—everybody! It's really a transformational film. It moves people," said one pastor.

"The Mask You Live In" (therepresentationproject.org/film/themask-you-live-in) explores how we as a society can raise healthier boys. According to the film, the media, parents, coaches, friends and even our schools create messages that cause boys to disengage from their feelings and avoid real friendships. Boys learn to objectify and devalue women and to use violence to solve conflict. But it doesn't have to remain so; we can raise and influence boys to be caring, respectful and able to develop healthy relationships throughout their lives.

Gather magazine observes the Reformation



As the ELCA observes the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation in 2017, Gather magazine is offering Bible studies that enlighten and illuminate reformation and transformation.

Gather, the magazine of Women of the ELCA, offers a mix of articles, theological reflections, devotions, and stories of comfort and challenge that help readers grow in faith and engage in ministry and action.

In the spring of 2017, Kit Kleinhans, a professor at Wartburg College in Waverly, Iowa, will share a foursession Reformation Bible study on "Galatians: Christian faith and Christian freedom."

"Biblical scholars describe Paul's letter to the Galatians as the Magna Carta of Christian freedom," Kleinhans writes. "Martin Luther called it 'my Katie von Bora.' Like his marriage to Katie, Luther's relationship with Galatians was a rich and lasting one."


