Week 4 Devotion: Lourdes Al Sayeh

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set free those who are oppressed." – Luke 4:18

In these times, we believers hold on to the tradition of Lent in preparing to commemorate the death and resurrection of Jesus. Christ made the ultimate sacrifice, and through the cross and his resurrection, he offers us eternal life. As followers of Christ, we remember Jesus' way of life and his call for us to live in service to our neighbors and to God.

In Luke 4:18, we see Jesus fulfilling the prophecy of Isaiah 61:1. He names himself as the anointed one from the Lord, initiating a new dawn and a sacred new beginning for us. This beginning is centered on the sacred image in which God creates us to bear witness to God's kingdom on earth. In God's kingdom, no voice of injustice is heard, there is no destruction, people are judged fairly, and rulers govern with peace. Jesus' proclamation confirms the beginning God's kingdom on earth and the fulfillment of ancient promises for the poor, weak and forsaken.

Jesus' embodiment as the true revelation of God models for us how to bear witness to the kingdom of God. We see this in the disciples' transformation from prejudiced, spiritually ignorant men into some of the greatest Christian leaders of the first century. They excelled in their service despite harsh conditions, being active where they were and serving the weak the forsaken, and the widows. They embodied the practical application of the new beginning that resulted from Christ's death and resurrection.

In service such as this, we work to fulfill humanity's sacredness, striving for equity for all and advocating for justice, liberation and love. We have a role in this message, and as Palestinian Christians, we take pride in the earliest Christian witness happening here. But the Christian witness is now worldwide—it is all our responsibility to represent Jesus in our communities. Fasting is empty if we are not active in the work of justice, compassion, and love. What is the benefit of our worship if we do not apply to our own communities the purpose for which Christ came, which was to bring the kingdom of God?

As a proud Palestinian, I pray that the message of Christ is applied here in Palestine. I pray that the world will look at my siblings in Christ and my community with the eyes of our Creator, the one who gave his life to revitalize justice, peace and hope.
